

Preparing for Teaching in the Age of Al A Faculty Checklist



Include an Al Syllabus Statement

- Craft a clear Al usage policy, specifying if and when Al tools are allowed (e.g., for brainstorming, research assistance, or not at all in graded work).
- Include examples of acceptable and unacceptable uses, so students have a concrete understanding of expectations.

Familiarize Yourself with Al Tools

- Spend time exploring how common AI tools work and their limitations.
- Try generating text, images, or summaries in these tools to get a feel for how students might use them, noting any issues or biases they reveal.

Test Your Assessments in Al Tools

- Run a few of your assignments or test questions through a GenAl tool, like Microsoft Copilot (Log into Copilot with PSU credentials for data protection)
- Document any areas where the AI provides easily generated responses and consider tweaking those assignments to require more analysis or personal insights.

Revamp One Assignment: Focus on Process Over Product

- Choose an existing assignment and restructure it to focus on the steps of problem-solving, analysis, or research (e.g., by requiring reflections, drafts, or step-by-step documentation).
- This emphasizes understanding and effort rather than just a polished final answer, which can reduce Al's effectiveness in completing it without student effort.

Schedule Al Ethics Discussions During the Semester

- Host 1-2 conversations or group activities that cover ethical considerations of AI in education, your academic discipline, and society.
- Provide real-world examples and ask students to consider potential biases, privacy issues, or misinformation Al might produce, encouraging them to think critically about responsible use.
